

Lynn Scarlett, former Deputy Secretary and Chief Operating Officer of the U.S. Department of the Interior from 2005-2009, is a senior Visiting Scholar at Resources for the Future in Washington, D.C. and an environmental analyst working on climate change adaptation, environmental risk management, “green business and infrastructure,” energy and water issues, landscape-scale conservation, and science and decision making. Project partners include the US Forest Service, US Army Corps of Engineers, US Department of Agriculture’s Office of Environmental Markets, Rice University, Central Arizona Project, Lincoln Institute, and research for the Oil Spill Commission.

In 2009, Scarlett served as a Distinguished Visiting Lecturer on climate change at the University of California Bren School of Environmental Science and Management and is an Adjunct Faculty with the Carnegie Mellon School of Public Policy. She is a Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration. She became Deputy Secretary of the Interior Department, which manages 507 million acres of public lands and offshore waters, after serving for 4 years as the Department's Assistant Secretary for Policy, Management and Budget. She served as Acting Secretary of the Department for two months in 2006.

Ms. Scarlett chaired the Department's Climate Change Task Force. She is author of numerous publications on environmental policies, including “Green, Clean, and Dollar Smart,” on urban greening, published in February 2010 by the Environmental Defense Fund. Ms. Scarlett serves on the board of the American Hiking Society, the Continental Divide Trail Alliance, RESOLVE (nonprofit environmental dispute resolution), and Santa Barbara Girls Inc., and is a trustee emeritus of the Udall Foundation. She received her B.A. and M.A. in political science from the University of California, Santa Barbara, where she also completed her Ph.D. coursework and exams in political science and political economy. She is an avid hiker, canoe enthusiast, and birder.
